
Grass withers, flowers fade, but the Word of our God endures forever. Translators come, translations go, but the Word of our God endures forever.

The translation of the Minor Prophets has been completed and is in the last stages of proofreading before submission to Northwestern Publishing House. When this is done, NPH will have the entire translation. Our second check proofreading of the NPH printouts of the Old Testament has been completed through Song of Songs. Third level proofreading is now underway on Isaiah through Daniel. A final fourth check is also being made of the final setups of Genesis through Deuteronomy. So although base translation work is almost done, there still is a lot of work to do in preparing the texts for printing. This will take some time.

2017 Preview Edition

The 2017 Reformation Anniversary Edition of the EHV New Testament and Psalms has been on sale for about four months now and distribution is going well. Over 9,000 have been sold and distributed, including gift copies to faculty and students of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, Martin Luther College, Bethany Lutheran College and Seminary, Luther Preparatory School, and Michigan Lutheran Seminary due to the gift of a generous donor. Kindle and Nook versions are available from Amazon and Barnes and Noble. We are continuing the delivery of review copies to various periodicals and scholars of various denominations of the church, and we are beginning to receive responses.

How soon the EHV appears on the Bible Gateway site depends on their set-up process. We have been told that EHV has entered the queue for their developers.



Lectionaries 2017-2018 Posted

The files for the 2017-2018 lectionaries used in WELS and LCMS congregations have been posted for the Advent/Christmas season.

The Wartburg Project is willing to grant permission to use EHV to the producers of other lectionary systems.

If you are working on a project for which you would like to use the EHV text, no permission is needed to use up to 1000 verses, unless the selection includes whole books of the Bible. For uses beyond 1000 verses, licenses are available on favorable terms.

If you would like to see a product based on the EHV, contact WP if we would be the expected publisher of the product, but if the expected publisher would be a publishing house, or a producer of Bible software, express your interest in the product to the potential producer (for example, to LOGOS or NPH). The more market interest there is, the sooner a product appears.

We have continued to receive requests to use the EHV in derived works like study Bibles, and we are trying to work out arrangements to accommodate these requests.

The EHV Study Bible

Planning and initial work on the EHV Study Bible is underway including the gathering of maps and charts. This work will get under serious way in November. Our current idea concerning the initial format is for an electronic Bible in landscape format, with the left side of the screen Biblical text and the right side of the screen scrolling notes. Maps and charts will be accessed through links to pop-ups. We are still seeking software or programming suggestions for implementing this set up. We welcome suggestions concerning the content and formats of the study Bible.

Excerpt from Article — Those Pesky Prepositions

In English we often fail to observe precise distinctions between prepositions. If a child is misbehaving in the yard, most parents would say, "Go in the house," which the child correctly interprets to mean, "Go and run around inside the house." The parent meant to say, "Go into the house and sit there," but failed to express clearly what he or she meant because of choosing the wrong preposition. If one is speaking very precisely, "a house on the lake" could be a houseboat, but more likely, it is not actually *on* the lake but is a building *next to* the lake. Prepositions also are put together with nouns in strangely irregular ways. "He went through the *door*" is something only Jesus could do. The rest of us go through *doorways*. But we regularly fail to say what we mean when it comes to the use of prepositions and their objects.

The situation is even worse when translating Hebrew and Greek propositions to English. Most Hebrew or Greek prepositions overlap with several English prepositions. The use of prepositions is largely idiomatic. There is no simple set of rules. The translator has to know what feels right in English.
