


Getting Ready for the Next School Year

We hope that by autumn all schools will again be operating safely. Now is the time to be thinking about ordering your EHV resources for the school year.



1. Top Ten Reasons that the EHV is Worship-Friendly

Excerpt:

6) Like the Lutherbibel the EHV is translated for the ear no less than for the eye. Luther realized that his Bible would be read aloud in church and in family devotion, therefore he tried to make the sound pleasing to the ear. He avoided harsh constructions, unbalanced sentences and disturbing subordinate clauses. The result was a rhythmic flow of language.

All the EHV lessons have been thoroughly "sound tested" by congregations.

2. The Use of Contractions in the Bible (FAQ 61)



Excerpt:

We are not trying to make Judeans sound like 21st century Americans. We are trying to make them sound like ancient Judeans who spoke good English. Did they contract words in their daily speech? Probably, because that is a very normal and natural process of speech. More to the point is whether the scribes who recorded that speech wanted to record it with contractions. Did they want us to read it with contractions? Probably not, if the intense efforts of the Masoretes to insist on exact pronunciation reflect the intent of the text. Both Jews and Christians are typically more formal in their church and synagogue reading than in daily conversation.
